INTRODUCTION

Thank you for helping inform the schematic design for Saskatoon's new central library by hosting a Kitchen Table Conversation.

Kitchen Table Conversations are part of our broader community engagement process. You are contributing to a process that includes:

- Online surveys and interactive activities.
- Meetings with key community stakeholders and groups.
- Facilitated community workshops.
- Consultation with volunteer resident advisory groups.

Kitchen Table Conversations are designed for a small group of people who get together to talk in a comfortable and informal setting. They are great for people who would rather have a conversation than complete an online survey or attend a public forum. The Discussion Guide helps facilitate a conversation with family, friends, neighbours and colleagues about the new central library.

Anyone can host a discussion. All you need to do is bring together a group of people who are willing to participate. Participants don't need to be an expert on the subject of libraries or architecture. All they need is a willingness to listen and share ideas.

The information that comes out of your discussion will help the new central library design team achieve the project's vision of being a welcoming, inclusive and barrier-free place for everyone who calls Saskatoon home.

LET'S GET STARTED

This guide will help you host a Kitchen Table Conversation.

Included in this guide is:

- Background information about the new central library project.
- Information for conversation hosts.
- Information and guidelines for the meeting.
- A feedback sheet for recording the conversation.

TIPS FOR HOSTING

1. The setting should be comfortable and informal: a home, coffee shop, or during the pandemic, a telephone or video call. Please follow all COVID-19 public health orders.
2. Invite up to five people that you know.
3. When you invite people, direct them to the new central library website so they can learn more about the project at saskatooncentrallibrary.ca.
4. Plan for your discussion to take about 90 minutes. Suggested times are listed to keep your event on track.
5. Be prepared to moderate the conversation to make sure that you hear from everyone and that no one dominates the conversation. Also, you'll need to make sure that everyone acts respectfully, even if they disagree with another participant.
6. Your final job as host is to make sure the feedback and opinions of the group are recorded and submitted to the library.

GUIDELINES FOR PARTICIPATION

1. Speak on behalf of yourself only.
2. If you are not speaking, listen to others openly.
3. Assume the best intentions of other participants.
4. Be mindful of others and make sure everyone has the opportunity to participate and contribute.

PREPARING FOR THE DISCUSSION

As the host, you have an important role as facilitator. Your role is to read and understand this guide so that you can answer questions and help others. Your role also includes documenting the feedback and opinions of your group.

Kitchen Table Conversations are not votes. It's not about the number of people agreeing or disagreeing. It's about capturing a wide-range of perspectives, ideas and opinions.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

The design for the new central library draws inspiration from traditional First Nation and Métis architecture and Saskatoon's natural landscape.

The translucent exterior references the tipi and offers an abundance of diffused natural light and ever-present views of the prairie sky. At night, the library will be a glowing lantern—a beacon in the heart of Saskatoon. Designed as a tree, the building's interior structure has a concrete structural trunk and a light wood mass timber branching out to create an open and comfortable environment.
